Introduction

The NEPC Annual Report 2012–2013 was tabled in the Commonwealth Parliament on 11 February 2014 and in the Western Australian Parliament on 11 March 2014 and commits to publishing NEPM-UPM local government data, which become available after the NEPC report is published.

The collection of local government data is a requirement under part 17 of the NEPM-UPM and the Senior Officials Committee of the Standing council of Environment and Water agreed at the May 2012 meeting that this data will be placed on jurisdictions' websites.
